The game is a Mastertronic Added Dimension creation and it is compatable with all CPC's. The plot is that a place called PARADISE (not very original) has been infested by killer insects (wasps).

All you have to do is go around killing all the queens, to do this you need a super-bomb, which can be ordered via a radio. The bombs are droped by air and you have to locate the drop site and pick them up. The actual layout of the screen is very pleasing to the eye, with a border that is made of hexagons. The movement of your little robotic (spider type) transport is very smooth, and the insects are pretty good as well. The surface you walk on consists of ploughed fields, on which you can only travel on the direction of the troughs and there are some cobbled stones which you cannot travel on at all.

The game itself has 2500 hi-resolution screens and very very good sound. You will never get to see all 2500 screens, because after a while the game will start to get a bit boring.

Why can't all budget software be as brilliant as this one, M.A.D. has really out done themselves this time. The game is much better than certain £9.99 games I could mention. Quick don't wait, go out and buy it (preferably from us).

What a treat, two great games to review. This is easily equal to Amaurote, even though at first glance it may seem to be worse than Amaurote visualy, but the game itself more than makes up for that.

The object of the game is to break all the communication links of a hostile force, this force is the only hostile one in the universe, because every one else decided that war was silly so lets pack it in. The fact that all the goodies gave it up puts them at a disadvantage, because the bad guys have had ages to think up some super androids to kill anyone they don't like. So they choose you to get in your little ship and go and break all the com. links.

It turns out that on the first screens that the androids are not that dangerous at all, but there is a lot of them. An easy way to get around this is to position your ship almost touching the spot where the androids materialize and get a rythem going shooting them. This nearly always works, but always be aware of where the other android is, as you fight them two at a time.

The controls are easy to get to grips with, rotate left/right, forward/backward thrust etc. On your travels around one of the nine planets you soon become very short of fuel and laser power, these can be found dotted around the place.

My over all impression of the game is very good. The quality of budget game around lately is very pleasing to see, I say that as someone who has little money to spend on games, and before now I chose not to buy them at all because of the poor quality.

INTRODUCTION TO COMPUTING

This month we are going to deal with the different methods of creating a LOOP. The two main formats are shown below

1) FOR x=n1 to n2 : 'task' : NEXT

The variable x will take on the value from n1, then perform the task, and then 1 will be added to x, then the process starts again, until x is equal to n2.

There is a way to get the value of x to increase by a specified amount, by using the STEP command. In the following example n3=the amount to be added to x every repetition.

For x=n1 to n2 step n3 : task : next

2) Another kind of loop is the WHILE WEND loop.

This loop is a slightly different version of looping, because there is no counting involved on the computers part. After the while command a conditional jump ie. the computer waits until certain conditions a met before proceeding. In the following short program the computer waits until a key is pressed, before going to line 30:

- 10 WHILE inkey\$=""
- 20 WEND
- 30 PRINT "A KEY HAS BEEN PRESSED !!!!"

This kind of loop can of course be used for more complicated things, but there is no point in going in to them here.

Loops are very handy things as they are, but sometimes (quite frequently if you program often) they are not sufficient when used one at a time, so a method has to be implemented to have several loops interacting with each other, this is called nesting loops. There is an example of nested loops below.

- 10 FOR a=1 to 10
- 20 FOR b=1 to 10
- 30 PLOT a,b
- 40 NEXT b
- 50 NEXT a

This program will gradually draw a block in the bottom left hand corner of your screen. First 'a' is equal to 1 and 'b' increases from 1 to 10, plotting its position in the first column. 'a' is then increased to 2 and the procedure is repeated in the second column. This is a very simple example of nesting loops, but there is a virtually unlimited number of loops which can be nested.

PUBLIC DOMAIN SOFTWARE LIBRARY NEWS

Over the past few months many changes have been made to the Public Domain Software Library. One of the most obvious changes is that it is now only possible to order a whole disc full of programs, instead of individual ones. This will save us a lot of time as we dont have to worry about copying one program from one disc and then another from another etc.

This applies to both disc and cassette users, except with cassette users the disc is dumped to cassette. To order a disc of programs fill in a PD Request form and send that together with a tape or formatted disc and a Stamped Addressed Envelope.

As you will see, the software list at the moment is practically empty. This is because we have not been receiving contributions from you. If you can write BASIC or Machine Code programs then why not send in a few contributions. Remember the more programs in the library the better!

If you would like to contribute a program then please send the program on tape or disc along with a SAE (for return of tape/disc) and a letter explaining how your program works and what it does. It would be much better if you could either include instructions within the program or send a documentation file with the program. Documentation files should be written in standard ASCII format (ie from a word processor).

PLEASE MAKE SURE ANY PROGRAMS YOU SEND ARE PUBLIC DOMAIN.
NO PROGRAMS FROM MAGAZINES SHOULD BE SENT, THESE PROGRAMS ARE COPYRIGHT.

CASSETTE USERS SHOULD NOT ORDER CP/M PROGRAMS, THEY ARE FOR DISC ONLY.
